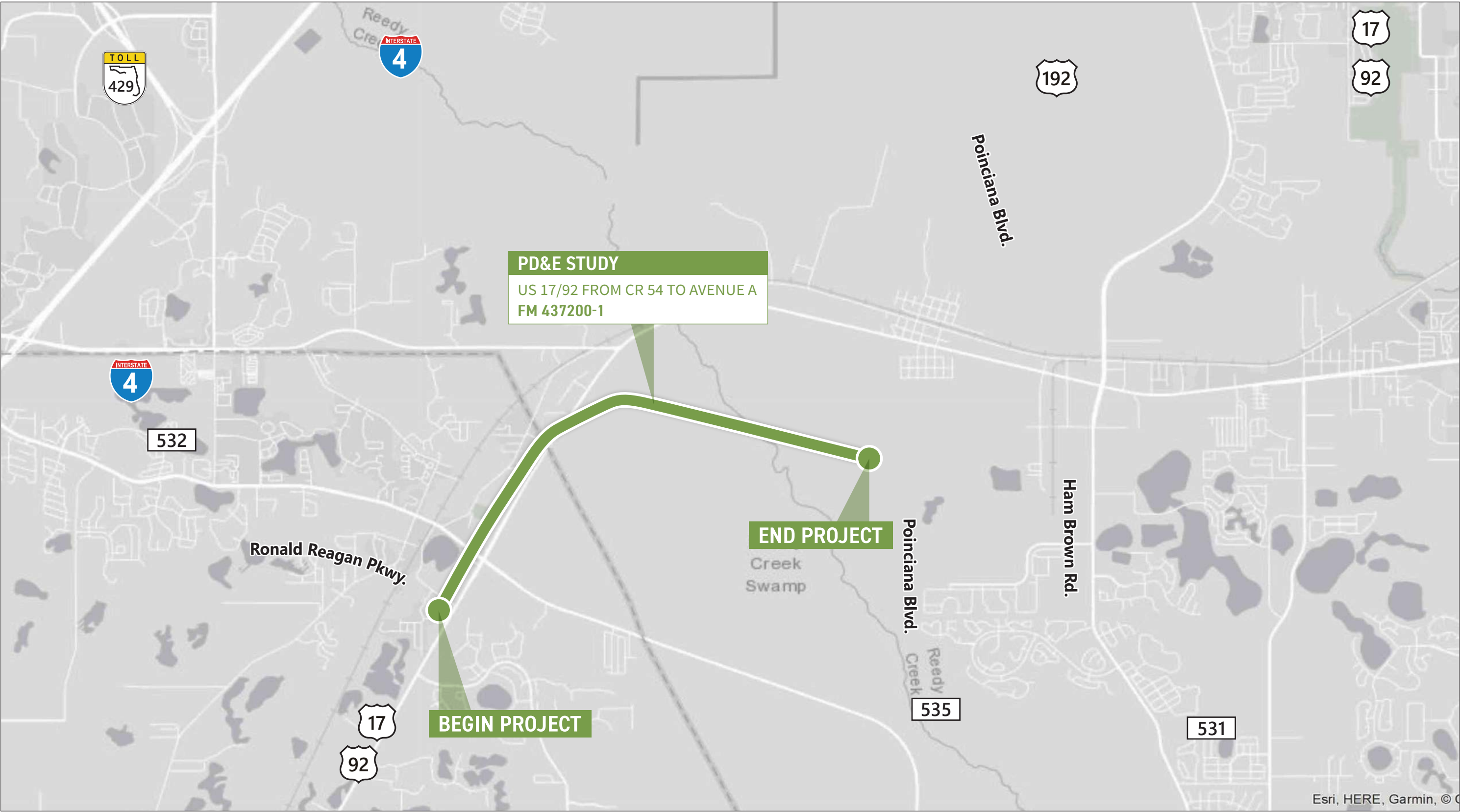

II. PROJECT BACKGROUND

This project involves the two-lane to four-lane widening of US 17/92 along the study corridor from CR 54 (Polk County) to Avenue A (Osceola County) a distance of approximately 5.04 miles. The project also involves the addition of a westbound bridge across Reedy Creek and conversion of the existing bridge over Reedy Creek to eastbound travel lanes (920174).

Previous work for the subject project includes a PD&E Study completed in 1996 and a Corridor Planning Study completed in February 2018. The public were engaged as part of both studies.

III. PROJECT GOALS

The goal of this project is to address current and future travel demand, improve safety, and provide system linkage for this regionally significant arterial roadway.

V. IDENTIFICATION OF AFFECTED COMMUNITIES AND STAKEHOLDERS

This project traverses through the census-designated communities of Loughman and Poinciana and the unincorporated community of Intercession City. A map of the communities in relation to the project limits is provided within Figure 2. The demographics of the study area was obtained through a Sociocultural Data Report (SDR) analysis. A copy of the SDR is attached to this PIP. Based on the demographics of the study area, 17% of the population and households are below poverty level, 75% of the population identifies as minority, 14% of the population are aged 20 to 64 with a disability, and 8% of the population identifies as speaking English not well or not at all.

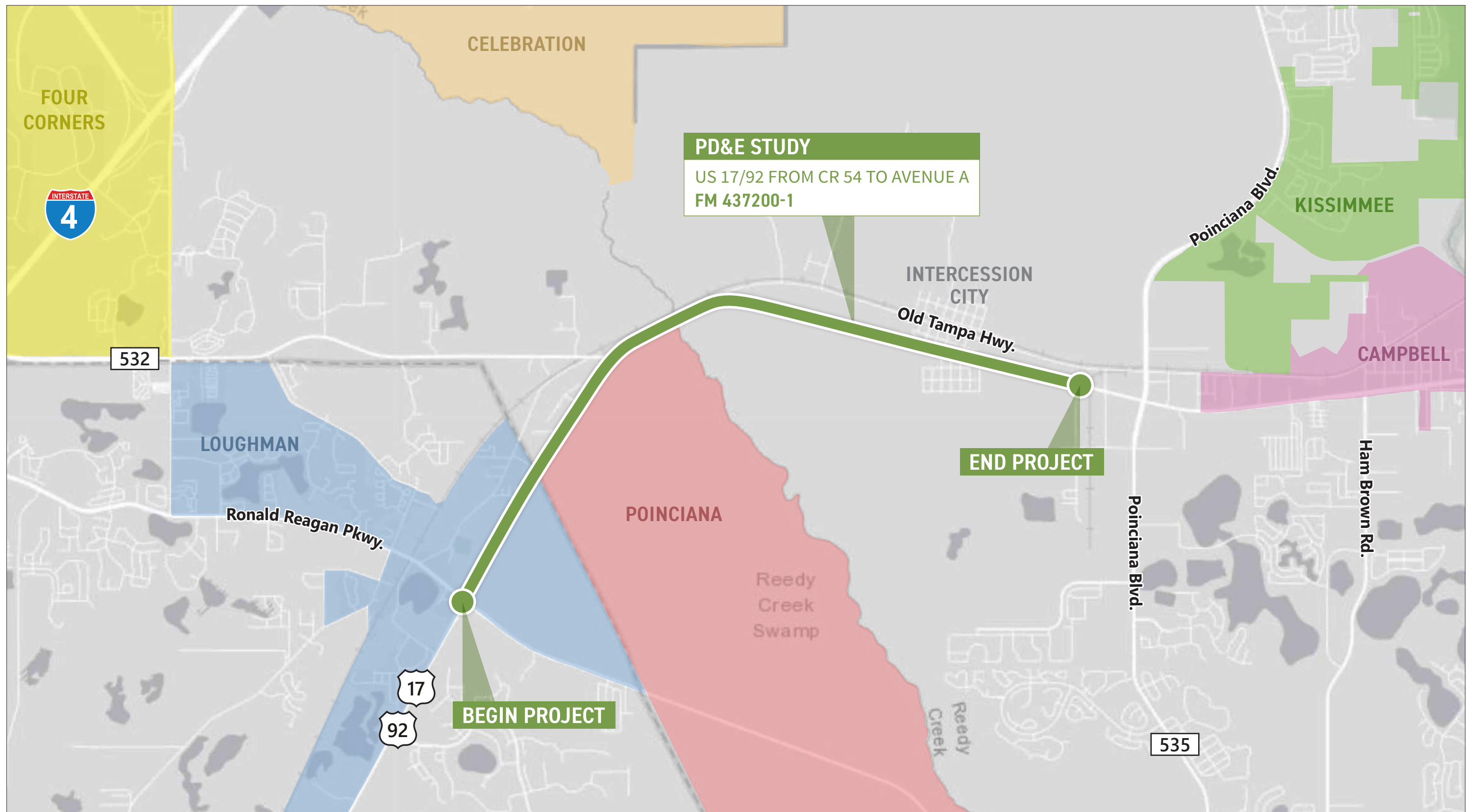
To better understand the potential language and disability needs within the study area, a detailed review using the 2018 American Community Survey (ACS) Five-Year Estimate (Tables B01001, C16002, C17002,

and S1810) was conducted and attached to this PIP. Based on the block group data, population characteristics relating to Limited English Proficiency (LEP) show 7% Spanish LEP and 1% IndoEuro LEP within the US 17/92 study area. Disability details were not available at the block group level for the study area; therefore, census tract data was collected as an alternative. Based on census tract data, population characteristics relating to disabilities show 2% of population with hearing disability, 2% of population with vision disability, 6% of population with cognitive disability, and 6% of population with ambulatory disability.

Therefore, the study team will provide written Spanish translation of all property owner notifications and post public meeting/hearing advertisements in the local Spanish newspaper. In addition, bilingual staff will be made available at the public meeting/hearing to serve members of the Spanish speaking community. The study team will ensure Americans with Disabilities (ADA) compliance for all public engagement locations.

In addition to working with the media, a number of different notification techniques will be used throughout the project development process. A brief description of these techniques is provided below.

Letters/Newsletters:	Invitational and informational letters and newsletters will be distributed to elected and appointed officials, property owners/tenants, business owners/operators, and interested parties. It is anticipated that four newsletters will be distributed for this study: a Project Kick-off Newsletter, a newsletter for the Public Workshop, a newsletter for the Public Hearing, and a final newsletter notifying the public of the approval of the preferred alternative and Location and Design Concept Acceptance (LDCA).
News/Press Releases:	News/press releases will be submitted to the FDOT for distribution seven days prior to each public meeting and the public hearing.
Public Notices/Ads:	Public advertisement will be published in the area newspaper with the largest circulation once prior to the public meeting, twice prior to the public hearing and once to announce Location and Design Concept Acceptance (LDCA) at the end of the study.
Public Announcements:	In order to distribute PD&E phase information, copies of the newsletters will be made available to organizations such as neighborhood/civic groups, the FDOT, and Osceola and Polk Counties, to publish in existing newsletters and websites. Any such correspondence will be coordinated through the District's Public Information Office (PIO).

VII. COORDINATION WITH OSCEOLA AND POLK COUNTIES

Copies of aerial maps depicting all alignment and design concepts under consideration, along with draft copies of engineering and environmental study documentation, will be furnished to the County Engineers, with their review and written comments solicited. Updated information will also be forwarded to the counties for review and comment prior to the scheduled public hearing.

VIII. PUBLIC HEARING

In compliance with the Project Development and Environment (PD&E) Manual, 23 CFR 771, and Section 339.155, F.S., a public hearing will be held.

Public Hearing Site: The public hearing will be held at an appropriate facility convenient to the study area.

Public Advertisement: An advertisement will appear in the Orlando Sentinel, Osceola County News Gazette, and Polk County Sun twice. The first ad appearing at least 15 days but no more than 30 days prior to the hearing. The second ad should run seven to 12 days prior prior to the public hearing.

All advertisements will be sent to local newspapers via e-mail or by registered mail, return receipt requested.

In addition, an announcement of the public hearing will be published in the *Florida Administrative Register* at least 7 days prior to the public hearing. See Section 11.2.5.4.4 for instructions regarding FAR Ad submittal.

Letters of Invitation: Letters will be mailed to all property owners as required by Section 339.155, F.S., and to local elected and appointed government officials notifying them of the upcoming public hearing. Notices may be hand-delivered to residences and businesses located directly along the project corridor as deemed necessary by the FDOT.

Hearing Preparation:	Slide presentations and/or video presentations, project corridor aerial maps, graphics, and handouts will be prepared to supplement the oral public hearing presentation.
Transcript:	A verbatim transcript of the public hearing will be compiled to include written comments received at the hearing and written comments received at the hearing and written comments received within the established comment period after the hearing. All public hearing documentation (handouts, presentation, graphics, etc.) will be included with the transcript. The transcript will include a script of the recorded presentation, if applicable.
Documents for Public Review:	All draft documents to support PD&E studies evaluation will be available for public review at least 21 calendar days prior to the public hearing date.
Locations of Documents for Public Review:	Public notice will be provided in the public hearing advertisement and by mailed invitational letters as to where the study documents are located for public review. Title VI and Related Statues:	Information about the Title VI Program will be provided in the presentation, by handout, signage, and through availability of personnel, on the Title VI Program and the Relocation Assistance Program.
Americans with Disabilities Act Compliance:	Notification of the Department's intent to comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act will be provided in the public advertisements for the public hearing, in invitational letters to property owners/tenants and local officials, in handouts, and by selection of a public hearing site this meets ADA requirements.

IX. PUBLIC HEARING FOLLOW-UP

Responses:	Responses to letters received as a result of the hearing and questions and comments not answered at the public hearing will be made in writing.
Recommendation Notice:	A legal notice announcing the Office of Environmental Management's (OEM's) approval of the final document and recommendations will be published in the Orlando Sentinel, Osceola News Gazette, and Polk County Sun newspapers. In addition, press releases detailing the Department's recommendations will be provided to local media.
Public Hearing Transcript Package:	A Transcript Package will be produced and submitted following the public hearing. The Transcript Package will include a verbatim hearing transcript prepared by an approved court reporter, an errata sheet detailing any transcript discrepancies, a copy of correspondence received by the

Department as part of the public hearing record, and affidavits of publication for newspaper ads advertising the hearing.

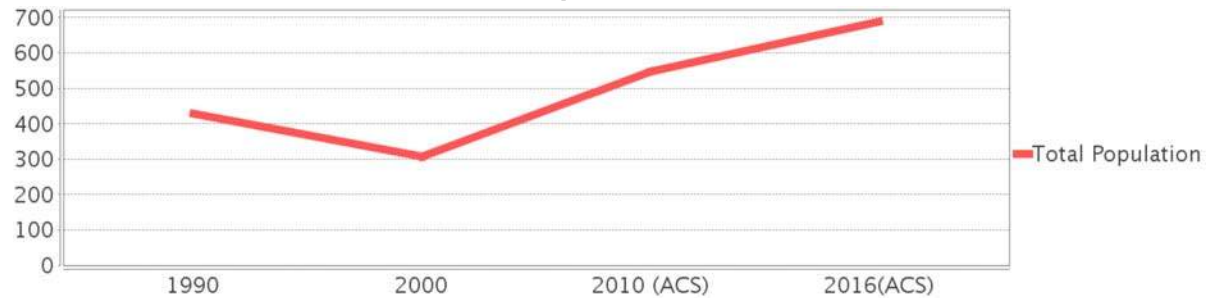

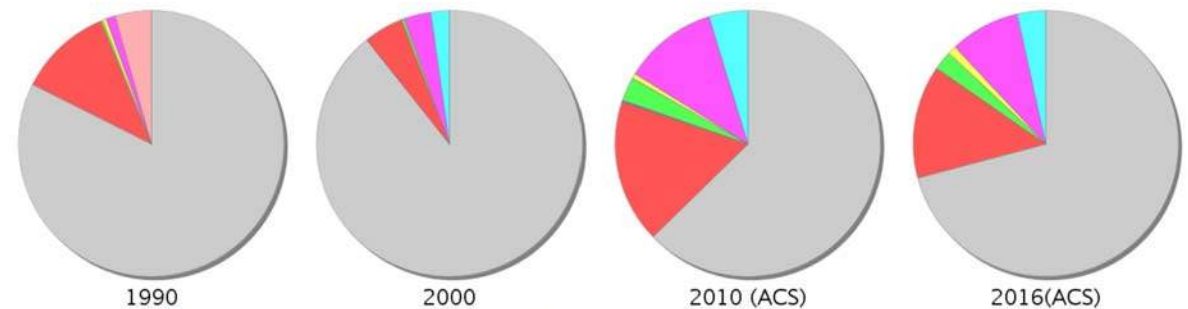

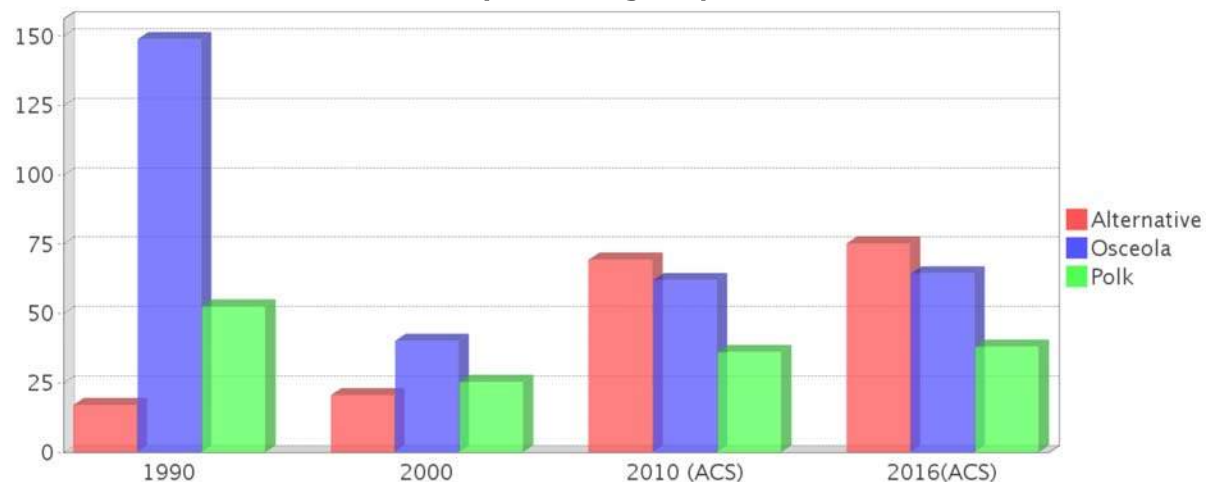

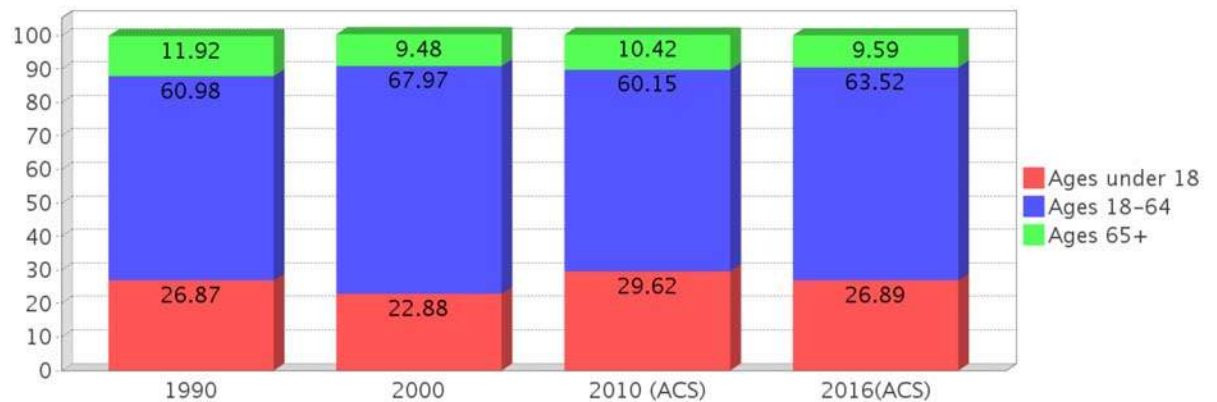

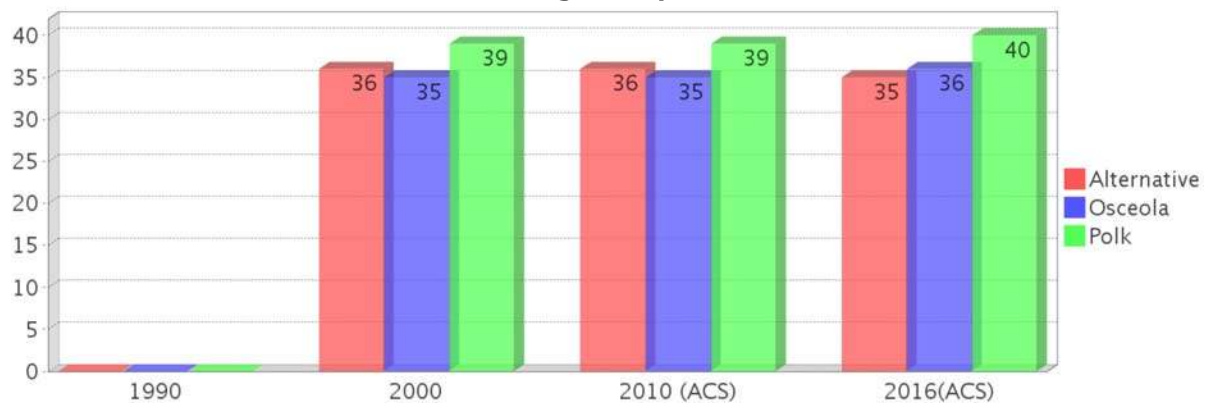
Population by Age Group

Median Age Comparison

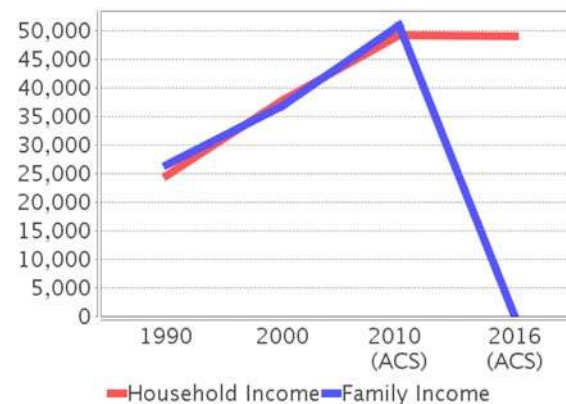

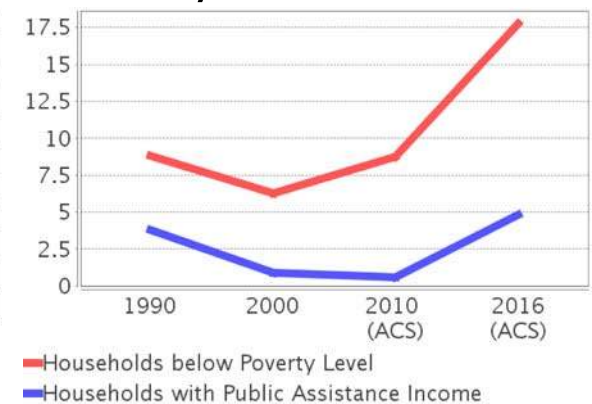

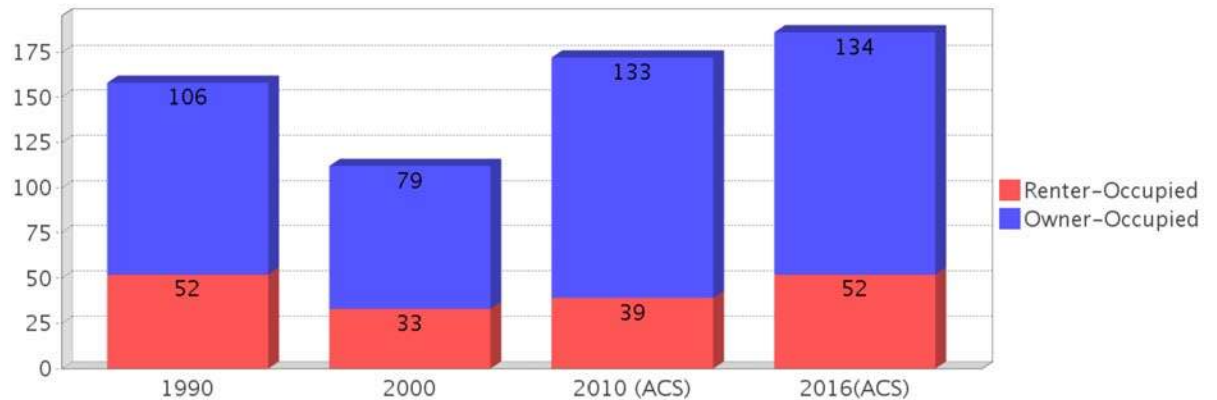

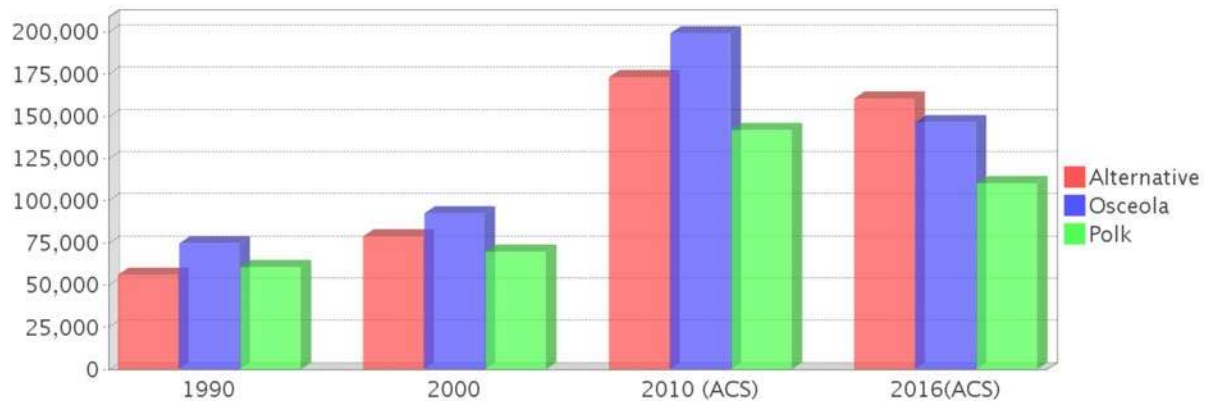

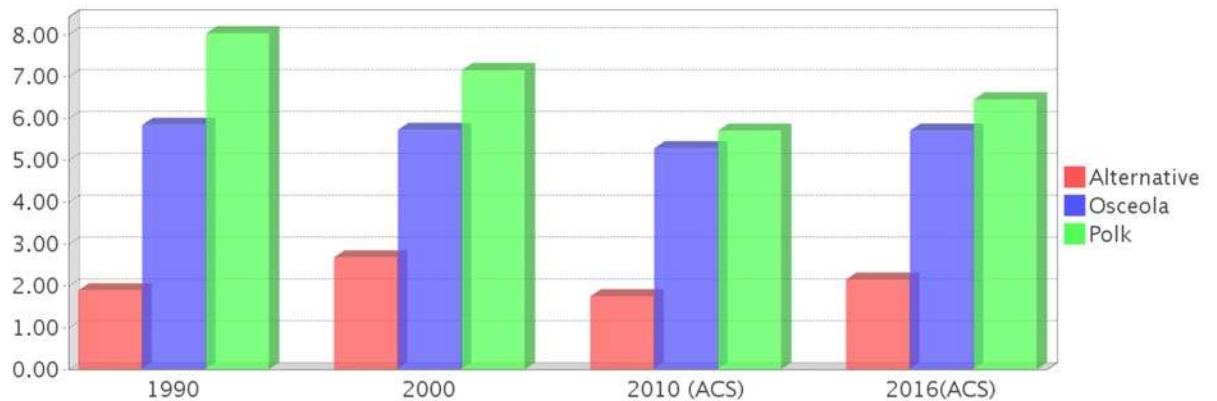
Housing Tenure



Median Housing Value Comparison

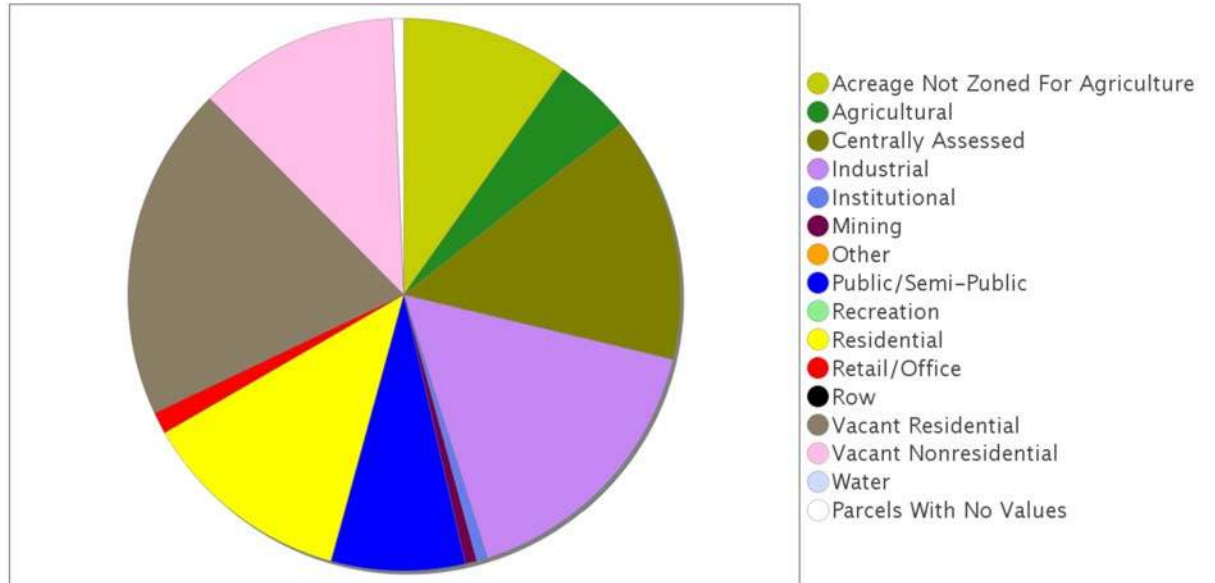

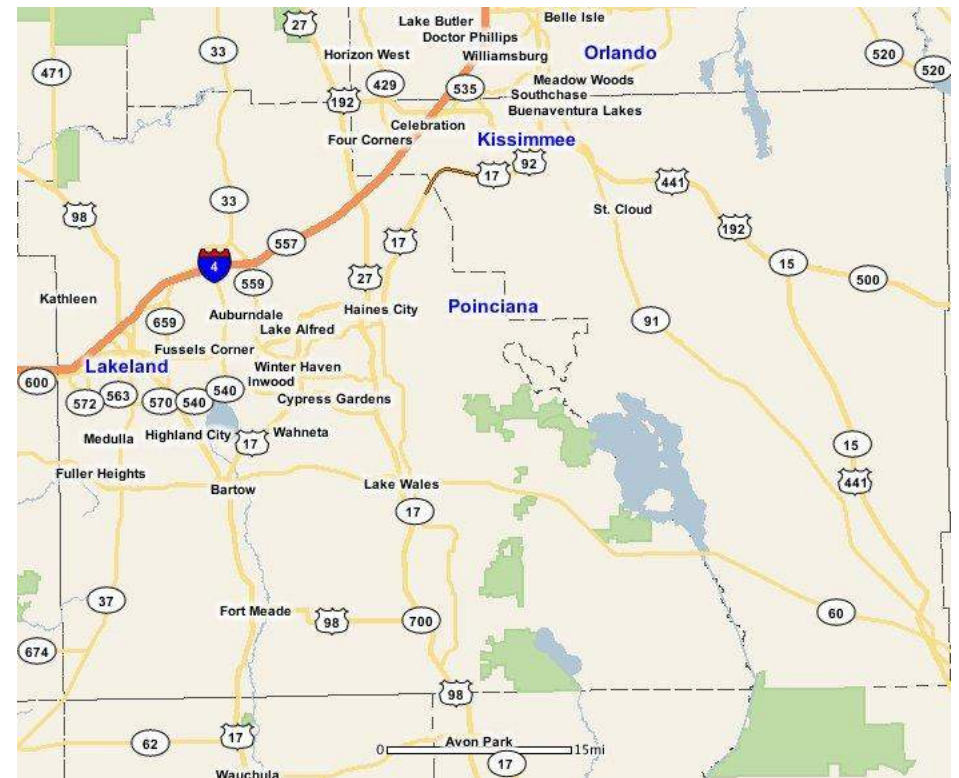

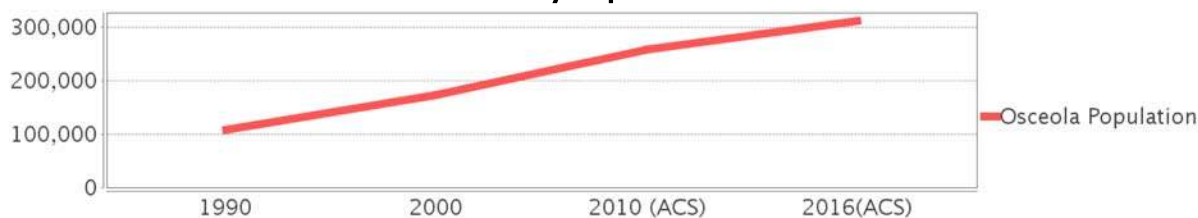

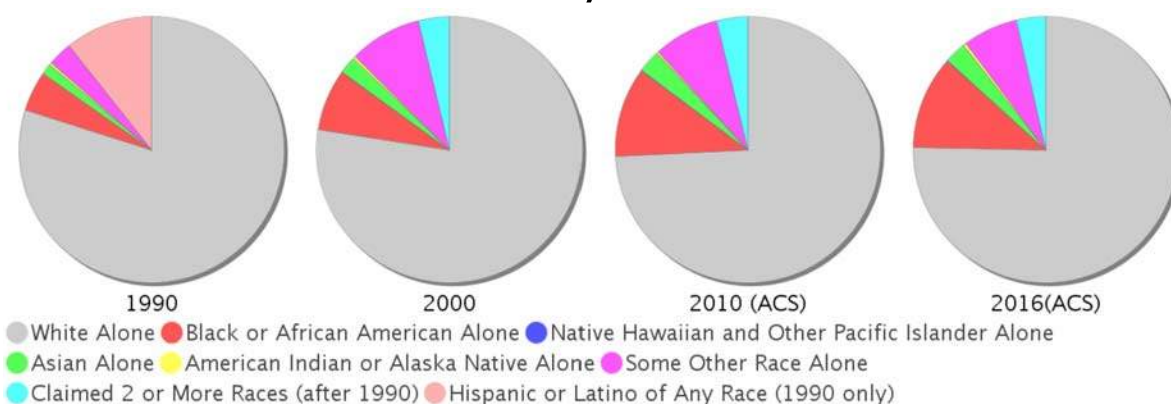

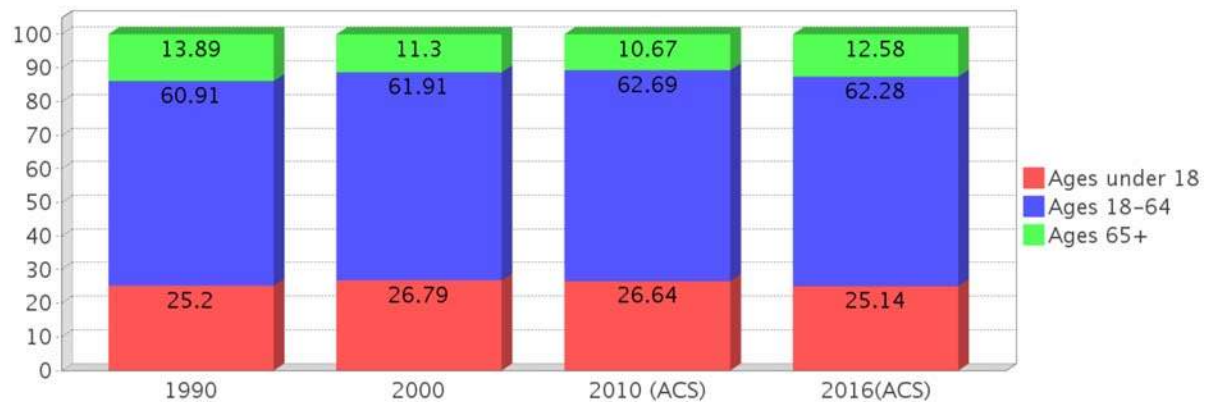

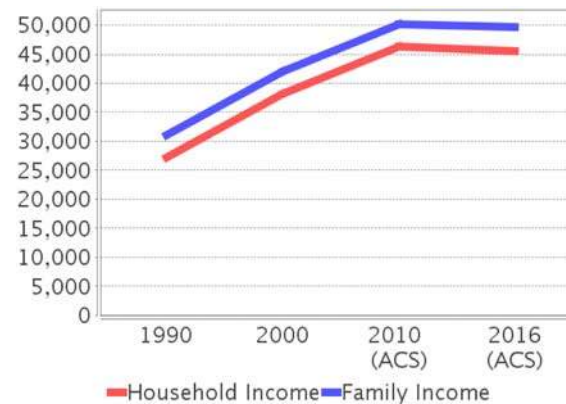
Percentage Population by Age Group



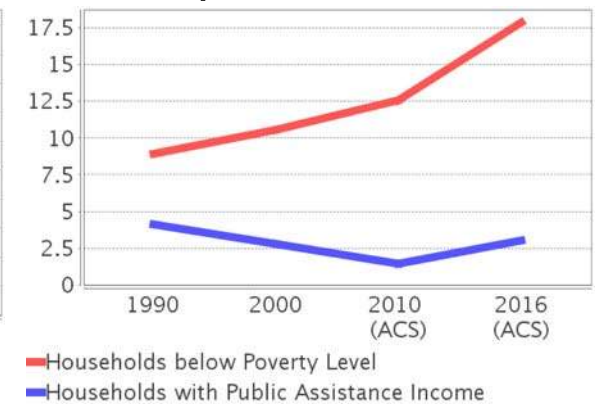

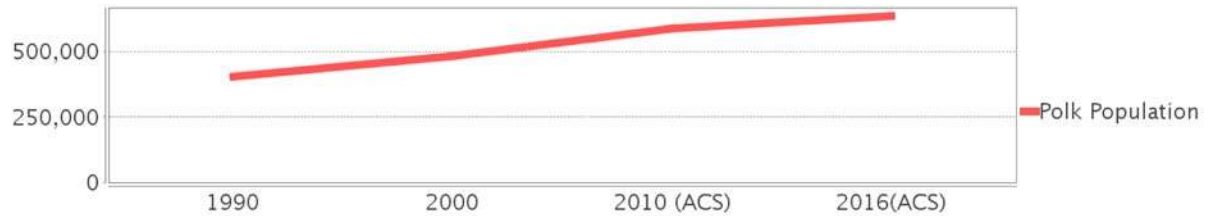

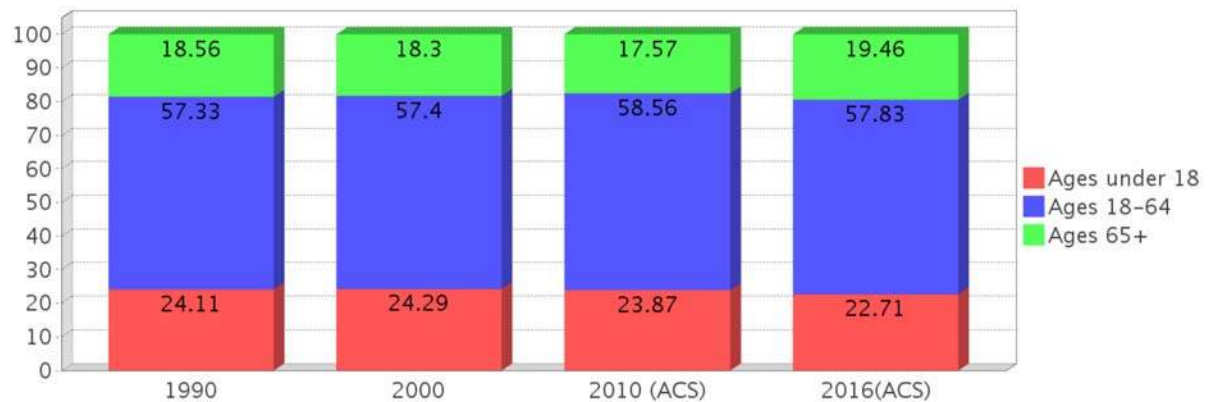

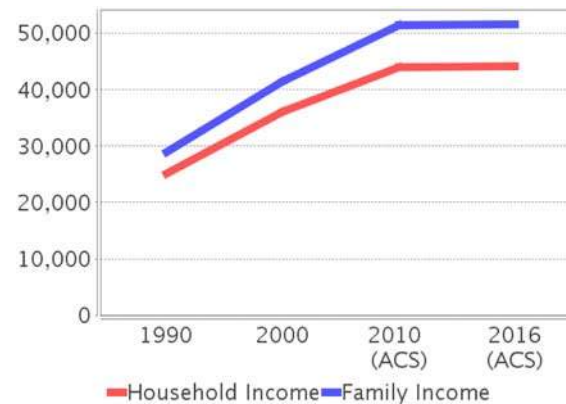
Percentage Population by Age Group



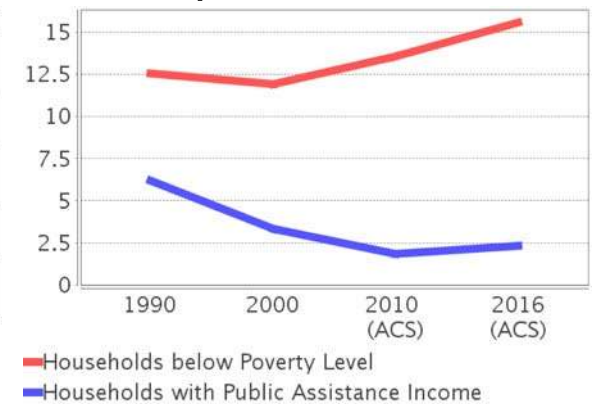

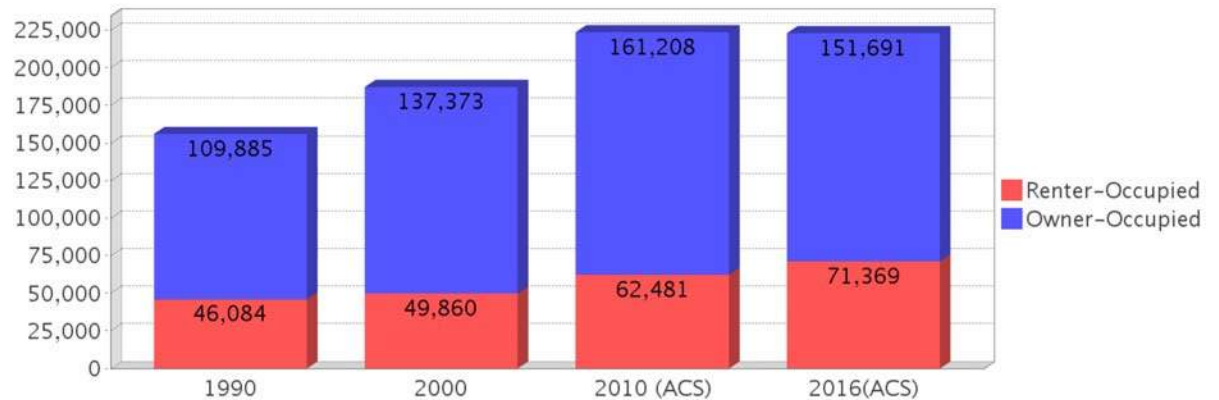
